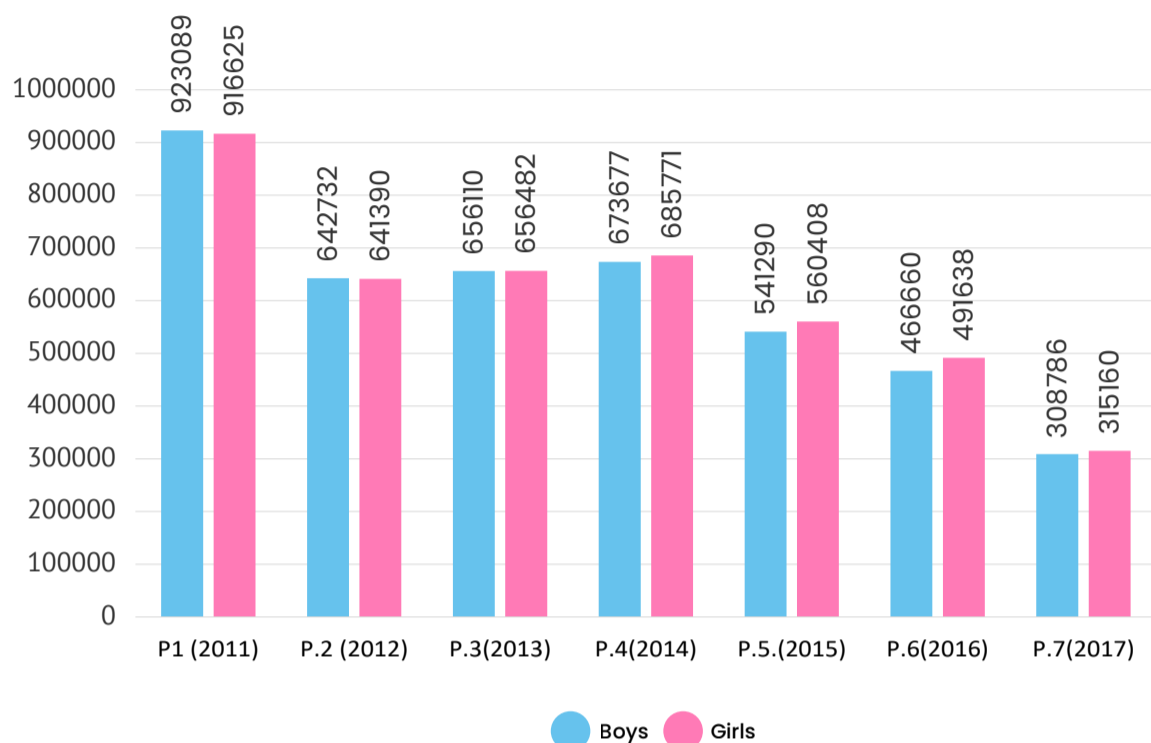

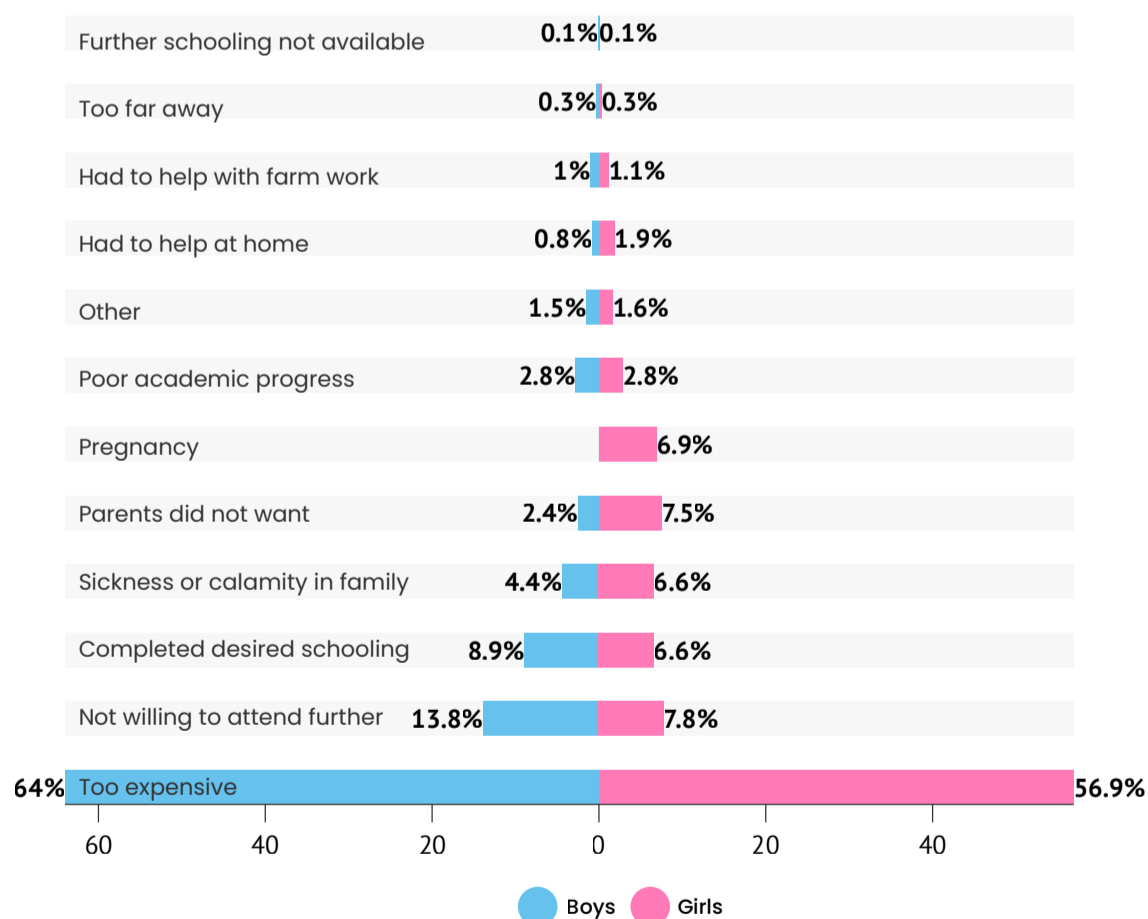
Primary school enrolment rate by class and sex

6.6% Sickness and calamity

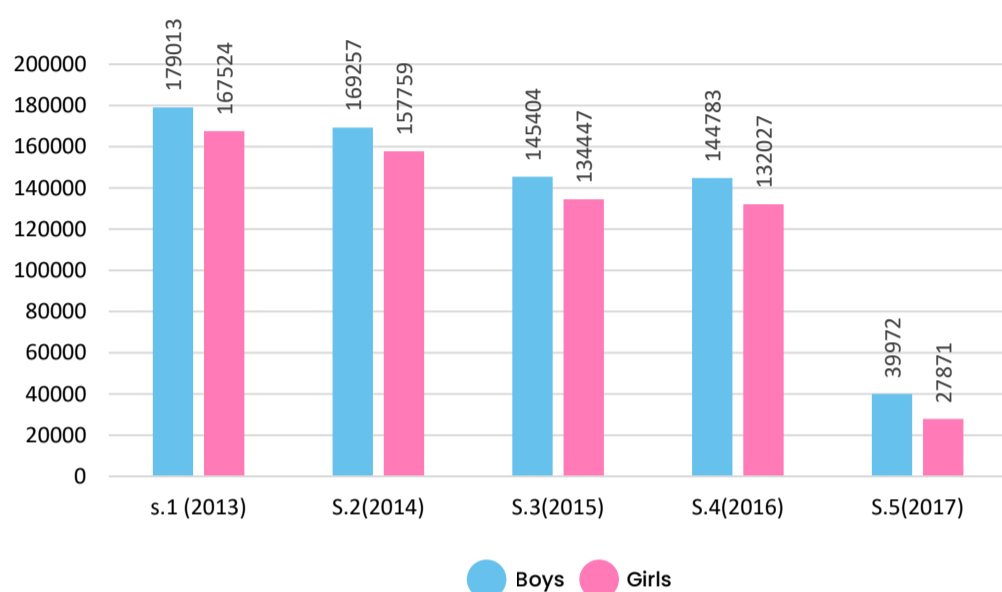
53% of Girls drop out of school due to affordability compared to **64%** of boys

Most pupils drop out of school due to financial reasons

14.4% of Girls are unwilling to continue with education compared to **22.7%** of boys

Secondary school enrolment rate by class and sex



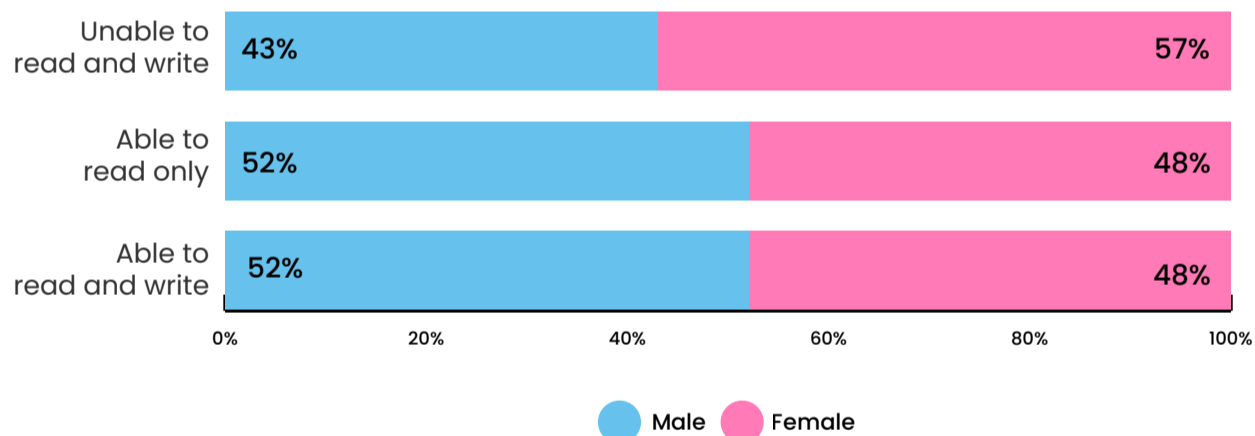

Fewer Girls **53%** than boys (**58%**) transition to secondary.

Fewer Girls **79%** than boys (**81%**) complete lower secondary.

Fewer Girls **21.1%** than boys (**27.6%**) transition from lower to upper secondary.

Gender ability to Read and Write

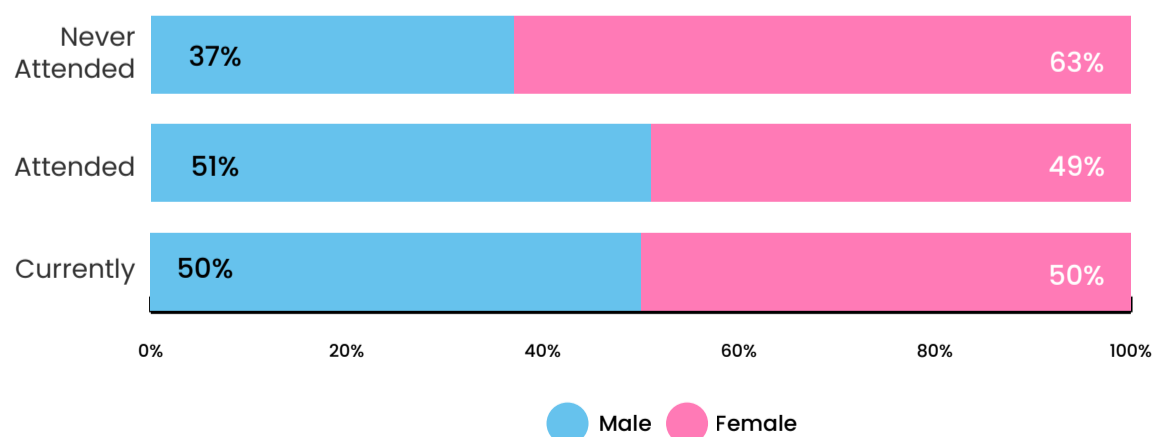

Formal school attendance by Gender



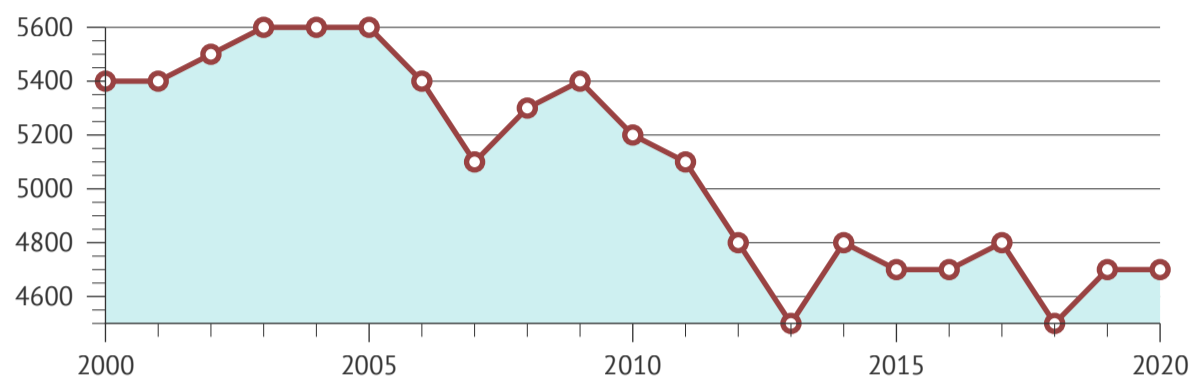

Number of maternal deaths since (2000-2020).



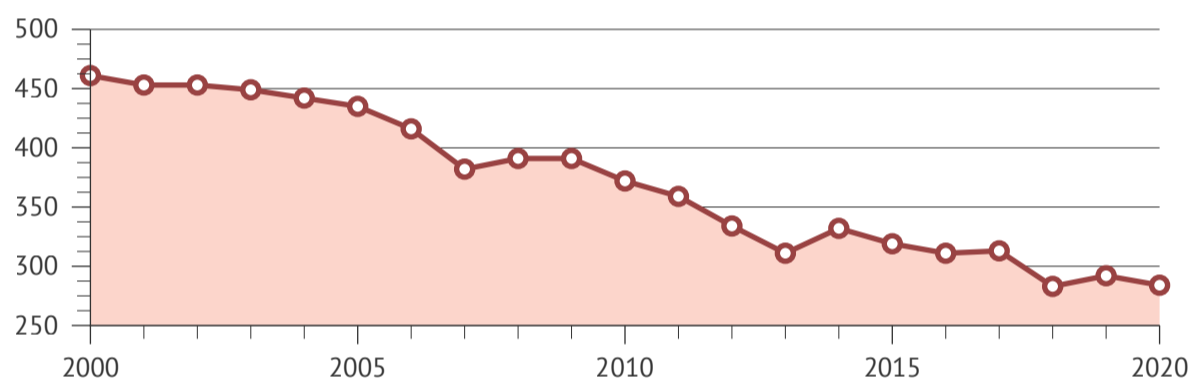

Maternal mortality ratio (modelled estimate, per 100,000 live births)



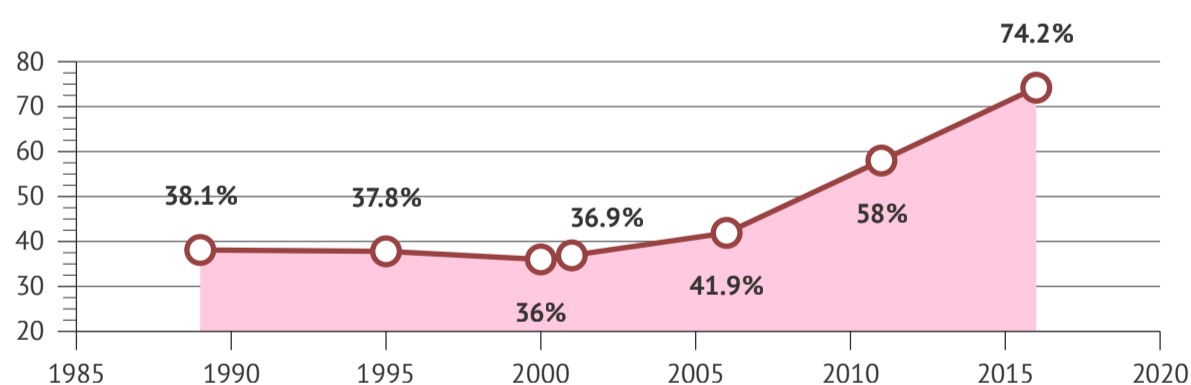

Births attended by skilled personnel

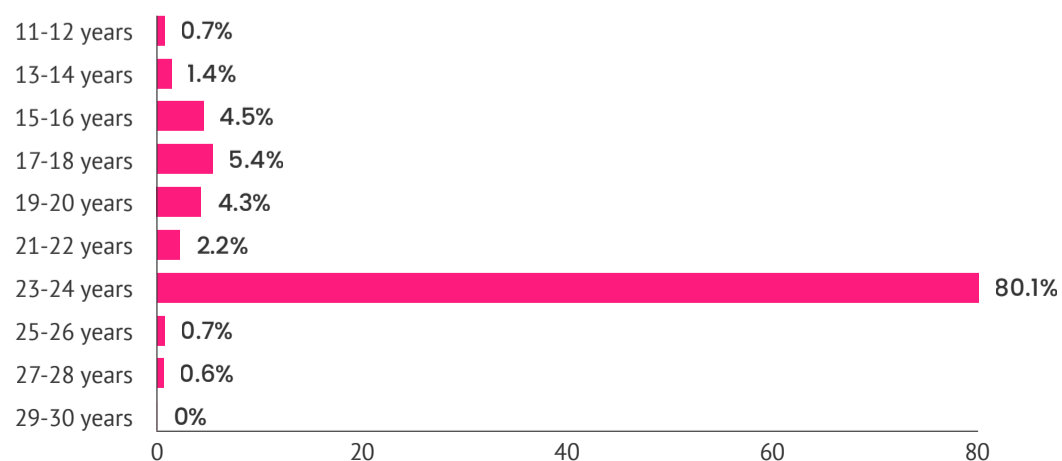
